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One month left for importers to move to the single customs platform

HMRC has this week advised importers that they only have a few weeks left to move over from CHIEF, to the more streamlined Customs Declaration Service (CDS) to keep importing goods into the UK. From 1st October all traders and declarants must submit import declarations through CDS and HMRC is advising those affected to begin this process now.

Businesses have been advised that those with customs agents should check they are ready to use CDS: whilst those without must check they are ready to self-declare using software that works with the system.

To help streamline the process further, HMRC has been directing customers to the relevant information packs on Gov.UK:

African Swine Fever: New controls on pork and pork products entering Great Britain

From Thursday 1 September <u>new restrictions are in place for the import of pork and pork products</u> into Great Britain from the European Union (EU) and European Free Trade Association (EFTA) states.

It is no longer legal to bring pork or pork products weighing over two kilograms into Great Britain unless they meet commercial EU production standards.

These restrictions will protect against the threat of African Swine Fever, which is spreading across Europe towards the UK.

Single Trade Window

Less than two weeks left to have your say on our consultation: The UK Single Trade Window: Consultation on Features to Inform Design and Legislation

The Government consultation relating to the UK Single Trade Window (STW) was published on 21 July on gov.uk. The consultation paper sets out the UK government's proposed approach to four key areas, where it's expected that legislation will be needed to enable the full functionality of the STW:

- The collection, use and sharing of data within government;
- Enabling government visibility, and use of, supply chain data;
- Facilitating trade through targeted international data sharing with other countries and territories; and
- Transitioning to the STW as the sole point of entry for border data required for transactional processes.

The Government is interested in any views or feedback you may have so that we can ensure the STW improves UK businesses' ability to import and export by reducing costs and

burdens, and ultimately drives economic growth. Your feedback will inform the approach the government takes to legislating to enable the STW. Plant Imports: new IPAFFS webpage and survey

The new IT system, IPAFFS, is now available for importers of plants and plant products to raise pre-notifications on from any country of origin.

Following insight from the IPAFFS introductory webinars that Defra recently held, they <u>have created a new webpage</u> which includes further information on how to locate commodity codes in IPAFFS.

If you are moving over to IPAFFS, <u>please could you fill in this short survey</u> to help us identify the correct information to communicate while you make this transition.

Reminder: Plant exports – move from eDomero to PHES (England and Wales only)

The Plant Health Export Service (PHES) is replacing PEACH and eDomero. Those who export plants and produce are already using PHES, and Defra are migrating over the final commodities so that all exporters of plants and plant products can submit export applications through PHES. The new service is faster, more efficient, and provides a modern and user-friendly interface for traders to submit export applications.

When do the final commodities need to move over to PHES?

- If you're an exporter of seeds, you can no longer apply using eDomero and will need to move over to PHES and complete your export applications on there
- If you are an exporter of potatoes or bulbs, you can now move over to PHES and complete your export applications on there.

From the end of August you will not be able to make export applications on eDomero for potatoes.

From 12 September you will not be able to make export export applications for bulbs on eDomero.
