# Essential maintenance for the Automatic Licence Verification Service (ALVS) on CDS/CHIEF

On Sunday 11 December between 8am and 9pm, process declarations lodged on either Customs Declaration Service (CDS) or Customs Handling of Import Export Freight (CHIEF) requiring approval through the ALVS will not be automatically processed.

This will affect those who move live animals and fresh produce. During this downtime HMRC will use manual processes to clear movements at the borders, which may take slightly longer than usual. They are therefore asking traders to try and avoid moving goods during this timeframe and consider moving goods on other days.

#### Trader steps to take:

If traders cannot arrange movements outside of this timeframe, then they will be asked to start the journey as normal, or send requests for clearance direct to the National Clearance Hub (NCH) in line with the guidelines below:

- NCH is authorised to manually clear all live animals requiring Common Health Entry Document (CHED).
- Procedure for Electronic Application for Certificates from the Horticultural Marketing Inspectorate (PEACH) / eDomero remain unaffected, therefore NCH is authorised to clear all Plant Health and Seed Inspectorate (PHSI) / Horticulture Market Inspectorate (HMI) regulated goods on presentation of Conformity Certificates, Phytosanitary Certificates and QRC's.
- NCH is authorised to clear all consignments of products requiring CHED.

# Sheep pox and goat pox in Spain: lifting of restrictions on raw milk and milk products

The import of raw milk and milk products is no longer restricted from Spain. This follows a risk assessment by Defra finding that these commodities do not pose an unacceptable level of risk to Great Britain.

# UK reaches deal with Norway to secure opportunities for UK fishing industry

The UK has reached an <u>agreement with Norway</u> to secure increased opportunities for the UK fishing industry in 2023. The deal secures quota of valuable North Sea whitefish stocks worth nearly £3 million and in arctic stocks worth nearly £2 million for 2023, and also ensures UK vessels have access to Norwegian waters to fish their own demersal and pelagic quota.

# The UK Conformity Assessed (UKCA) deadline now extended to 31 December 2024

The Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy (BEIS) announced on 14/11/22 the intention to introduce legislation to continue recognition of the CE marking and reversed epsilon marking until **31 December 2024** for most goods being placed on the market or put into service in Great Britain.

This is part of BEIS new Ministers' commitment to reduce burdens for industry including cutting costs for businesses and removing potential disruption.

### How to trade CITES controlled species

If you move or trade endangered species of plants and plant products listed on the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) list, then you must apply for CITES permits and certificates.

This includes not only live plants but also their parts and derivatives from seeds, flowers or logs to oils, powders, cosmetics or medicinal products, furniture, carvings, musical instruments, among others.

It is the responsibility of the UK trader to ensure that they know and follow the correct procedure. CITES listed species moved without valid permits must not be traded commercially.

Importing and (re-)exporting CITES-listed species without the relevant permits will deem the movement of those goods illegal.

## Upcoming Defra legislative changes

Defra has introduced legislation updating Plant Health import requirements across GB. Some legislative changes came into force on **25 November 2022**. This included changes to the list of GB quarantine pests. Blueberry rust (Thekopsora minima) no longer meets the criteria.

The remaining legislative changes will come into force on 3 May 2023.

The changes comply with international obligations and are important protective measures against pests of plants in the UK.
